
Water under the bridge - I hope!

After a fairly torrid 4 months, the mill has settled down to a new 'normal' with the waiting-time for orders much more sensible so I'm finding the time to carry out some much-needed maintenance that I'd had to put to one side whilst the demand for flour was so high.


A repair to the eastern waterwheel sluice gate was urgently needed to reduce leakage when it was closed. Fortunately this awkward job went very smoothly thanks to help from Adrian, John and Simon. It was a job I wasn't looking forward to as it involved creating a temporary but safe dam and working from inside the waterwheel, but the gate was in good condition and, with a little careful woodwork, we created a good seal, reducing the leak considerably and so preventing the risk of the waterwheel turning spontaneously when water levels are high. All of the front windows have been repaired over the last year thanks to Simon's woodworking skills and are now ready for a fresh coat of paint - the mill will soon look very smart indeed. A recent week-long survey by the Bat Conservation Trust has shown a very high bat population flying around and hunting by the building, including a rare species that the Trust is quite excited about. When the mass of data has been processed I'll let you know the results.

Due to the current Covid situation and the ongoing need for social distancing, I've decided not to open the mill to the public this year for the protection of both visitors and the volunteers. I'll review the possibilities in the spring.

Compton Verney Autumn Exhibition - Cranach, Artist and Innovator

The legacy of the Renaissance painter Lucas Cranach the Elder stretches across 500 years. Born around 1472 in Kronach, the German town from which he took his name, Cranach was a loyal court painter and confidant to his masters, the Electors of Saxony. Much more than a court artist, Cranach was also a printmaker and politician.

Independent and highly entrepreneurial, he was close friends with the radical thinker Martin Luther (1483-1546) and played an active role in the seismic religious changes that took place in his home city, Wittenberg. Skilfully navigating turbulent times, Cranach survived into his 80s and died a wealthy man, leaving a thriving workshop which continued through his son, Lucas Cranach the Younger (1515-1586).

The exhibition is in three rooms displaying art from many famous collections; exquisite portraits, intricate woodcut prints of biblical and topical subjects, and a celebration of the human form, male and female, including Venus, Cupid and Apollo. There is also a challenging juxtaposition of modern interpretations including a startling giant automaton of St Apollonia.

I was particularly drawn to two modern works in acrylic on birchwood by Raqib Shaw. As ever, the exhibition is beautifully presented with dark backgrounds highlighting the detail. Highly recommended and well worth the wait for its reopening. It runs until January 2021.

Lions Clubs provide vital assistance where it is needed

Lions Clubs of the British Isles have launched an appeal to support the people affected by the devastation in Lebanon. The Scouting team, led by Yvonne Paige-Stimson, has been brilliant during the time of CovID-19, even though they haven't had any subs income or face-to-face activities since January, they have been running virtual sessions to keep Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers engaged and busy for the last few months.

1st Wellesbourne do not have their own hut so they were not eligible to receive money from the £10k government CovID fund. The resumption of face to face activities with Scouts and Explorers (Cubs and Beavers will be starting soon) means they have had to provide new equipment, such as: cones (for social distancing), laminator pockets, visors, gloves, face masks, wipes, hand gel and a thermometer plus some extra kit because sharing is no longer possible.

Things continue to change apace, and we'd ask that you continue to check our website for up-to-date information before you visit. Please remember your face mask for the café and Avenue shop buildings.

Charlecote and Hampton Lucy residents are able to visit the parkland and Avenue Shop without pre-booking (no access from the shop to the parkland). If you have your passes available please bring them, otherwise proof of residency is required. All other visitors need to use the pre-bookable tickets system.

New deliveries of plants are still coming in to the Avenue Shop and we've brought in some of the most popular items from our other ranges too. You can buy Charlecote venison from the freezer in the Avenue shop too (not all cuts available all the time). Avenue shop open – at the time of writing – Thursdays to Mondays, 10am-4pm. We're so grateful to all of you who have visited us and your lovely comments about being able to walk around the parkland and the children's summer activities. Birds, butterflies and the deer of course

continue to provide interest for nature-lovers throughout September and this can be the best time of year for spotting fungus around the trees.

You'll have seen in the national press that the National Trust faces unprecedented difficulties and as a conservation charity we have been hit hard by the virus. Difficult decisions on the work we are able to do are being made every day.
