

A Celebration - 50 Years!

On Sunday, 11 October, 30 parishioners and friends of Ali and Chris Speller gathered at the morning service in St Peter's, Hampton Lucy, to celebrate his remarkable fifty years of service as Verger. It was conducted by Rev'd Andy Larkin and was intended that the Bishop of Coventry, Bishop Christopher, would be there to personally thank Ali and his wife Chris for their long service to the church and the community.

Sadly, at the very last moment, the Bishop's son tested positive for Covid-19 and he and his household were all confined in isolation. However, thanks to the impressive technical and IT skills of Rev'd Andy, the occasion was nevertheless a great success. Sue Lampitt read a charming history of Ali's 50 years written by Anne Corke, widow of the late Rev'd John Corke - a past Rector at St Peter's. Alison Harrison, Chair of the PCC, also spoke describing her long association with Ali and expressing her own and the Parish's appreciation and thanks. He was presented with framed copies of an official certificate marking the occasion and of Anne Corke's tribute, a floribunda rose named *Ali the Verger*, and a very large and appropriate card signed by his fellow parishioners.

For the first time in living memory Ali was almost lost for words but clearly touched by the occasion and the accolades! A shortened *Come and Worship* service was then enjoyed by all, and Ali's two favourite hymns - *Amazing Grace* and *Feed Me Oh Thou Great Redeemer* - were played by organist Robert Stagg. Bishop Christopher appeared on a pre-recorded video - which had only arrived at midnight the night before - expressing his thanks to Ali and Chris and giving the sermon. *Thank you* to all those who contributed to the arrangements - it was memorable and most enjoyable.

Dear friends

It is my pleasure to welcome a new member to our ministry team. Revd John Horton has recently moved to Wellesbourne and will be ministering across our six parishes on a part time basis. John is married to Liz, and comes to us with considerable experience from the charity sector with a particular focus on Africa. John's ordained ministry has been mainly in rural parishes in the United Kingdom. I know that you will join me in praying for John as he serves our parishes.

This edition will hopefully have arrived in your hands just before Remembrance Day. As Christians, the subject of war and remembrance might sometimes feel at odds with what we believe. After all, Christ said "Blessed are the peacemakers" and "Love your neighbour as you love yourself". Can peace and love come from the barrel of a gun or the blast of a bomb? This is a hard and complex question.

Pacifism is brave and noble, especially when it actually encounters violence. Whilst some are able to frame their lives with this viewpoint, for others there are situations that require a reaction - situations where inaction could be considered to be giving in to bullying or to letting injustice flourish.

There are wars where we act to protect ourselves, to defend against the aggression of others and then there are wars where we are not endangered but we act to defend a friend or a group of people being unjustly persecuted. Though it is always possible for our leaders to make mistakes, thankfully we don't live in a country that engages in hatred-fuelled, unprovoked acts of aggression.

History shows that love and peace can come after war, if those involved can see past the flawed ideologies that led to the conflict and instead focus on their common humanity. Indeed our present good relationship and economic partnership with Germany is ample testament to this.

With every conflict our nation enters into, there will be those who can see the rationale and those who can't. Once our democratic nation decides to use force alongside diplomacy, there are those amongst us who are told to risk their lives. The financial cost of war is considerable but it is dwarfed by the human cost. A price that has been paid by so many over the years, in order to secure our freedom. Whether we agree or disagree with war, whether we agree or disagree with any particular conflict, 11 November provides us with a time to pause and reflect, a time to remember the lives given in love for this nation.

I'm sure you join me in praying for our armed forces, for their families and for those who have lost loved ones in recent conflicts. Wishing you Christ's peace,

Warwickshire Trading Standards alerts

Warwickshire Trading Standards website contains lots of useful information aimed at preventing us from being parted from large sums of money or being the victim of fraud. The website is currently alerting us to scams involving fraudulent on-line traders, scam telephone calls, investment opportunities and even scams involving the Test and Trace system. An additional one to be aware of is given below:



Bogus Puppy Sellers

During lockdown, the popularity of buying a puppy has increased and this has encouraged scammers to take advantage of the increased demand. Buyers have reported attempting to purchase puppies via Internet small advertisements and social media websites where they are often asked to pay hundreds of pounds up front. Prospective owners are shown photographs or video of the puppy before fraudsters then take the money and disappear; no puppy is forthcoming. Buyers should also beware of purchasing illegally bred puppies (including illegal imports) and stolen puppies. As parents we have been raising much needed funds for the Royal Marines Charity for five years now; everything from abseiling down the BT Tower, crawling through tunnels and water filled tubes on the Commando Challenge and the yearly fundraiser, Cakes4Commandos. The charity supports the whole Royal Marines family, during and after military service, and has been especially critical in providing PTSD and combat injury support.

We are keen beekeepers and our lovely bees here in Hampton Lucy produce wonderful Honey4Heroes, available to you now. We ask for donations of around £7.00 per jar with 100% of that donation going directly to the charity. The honey crop is really special this year – very floral and with no rape seed crop it's a lovely deep golden colour. Our honey makes great Christmas presents – local produce and all for a great cause, but we have a limited supply and last year we sold out within a few days.

Before coronavirus struck, demand for community transport was rising dramatically in Warwickshire, driven by the needs of some of our most vulnerable residents: those who needed help to get to hospitals and health services, to stroke clubs, dance classes and many more social activities. To do things many of us then took for granted! And until March, when pandemic hit, this was what VASA helped to provide every day. Our services help change people's lives.

In the meantime, we've managed to restart our transport service for medical appointments thanks to our fantastic team of volunteers. Community spirit is at an all time high - and we need you to help us keep up the great work too! We're keen to recruit more drivers as soon as possible, as demand is starting to rise again and more people need to get to medical appointments. Here's how you can help our vulnerable passengers as a volunteer.

For some people, you may be the only person they can chat to that day. Knowing they can rely on someone who'll turn up on time, drive them to the right place and be ready to collect them after their appointment, makes them feel more confident and less stressed. And community transport is usually much cheaper than using taxis.

As a volunteer driver, you'll enjoy flexible hours to suit your lifestyle. The work may be challenging but also great fun! You can make a difference to other people's lives in a very short time - and it can change your life too, giving you new interests and confidence.

We've taken every precaution to make our service as safe and supportive as possible for drivers and passengers alike. This includes providing volunteers with a written agreement, detailed guidance and procedures to follow, PPE (including face masks for drivers and passengers) and practical advice.


Mr Alister T. Speller – Verger at St Peter Ad Vincula for Fifty Years

A personal reflection by Anne Corke

The strict meaning of the title of verger is the official who carries a 'verge' or mace before a dignitary. He takes care of the interior of the fabric in the church and keeps the congregation in order! How much more has Ali – as he is better known - accomplished?

His knowledge of the church building, the fabric, the tower, the boiler etc, is second to none. He also knows every patch of grass in the church yard, and remembers many souls who rest there. This knowledge is extremely beneficial to all new incumbents, and John was especially grateful for Ali's help and guidance when he was appointed as rector in 1980.

Ten years ago Ali acknowledged that he could not have carried out his work without the help of his wife Chris. During their fifty years they have raised a large amount of money for the church. This has been made by their very successful auctions, stalls at fêtes and fairs, his "hurdy-gurdy", and the treasures stored in his garden shed – "always good stuff stored in there"!



In the 1980's the church was generously given a very large Christmas tree. Every year this was always beautifully decorated by Ali and Chris with more and more lights and baubles appearing every year! The tree was much admired at the carol services and in particular at the Christmas Eve midnight mass. This attracted a full church with over 90 communicants on some occasions. Ali's fine figure ensures that he is a perfect Father Christmas and is in much demand in schools and parties during the festive season.

Several years ago a very valuable antique was stolen from the church. After touring all the local antique shops, he eventually recovered the church property himself – No need for Scotland Yard!

The cleaning of the church is a marathon task especially after a concert or a festival.

It has largely gone unknown that Ali and Chris have themselves donated many items for the benefit of the church.

Twenty years ago a small 'Pictorial History of Hampton Lucy' was compiled by the verger. This is a 'pictorial gem' with a selection of historical photographs, and it is well worth trying to locate a copy.

Finally, a wedding to remember. In the early 1980's St Peter's was the venue for a celebrity wedding. The service proceeded in the usual traditional way, until the bride emerged from the vestry after signing the register, with her baby on one arm and her bouquet on the other. A gentleman in the large congregation immediately stood up and shouted 'Cor that was quick'. This led to a great deal of cheering, clapping and mass movement in the church. The verger, remembering his duty, was soon on his feet politely ushering the congregation back into their pews, and so allow the bridal procession to continue down the aisle. After the service an elderly gentleman came up to John and Ali and said "Thank you both very much, that was the best wedding that I have ever attended and at my age I have been to quite a few". They both agreed "It's all in a day's work".


