New Equipment for Hampton Lucy George V Playing Field

Following a successful application for a grant from the Department of Education and the "Playbuilder" Scheme, we are now in a position to provide some splendid new playground equipment, which we are confident will provide new play experiences for children across a wide age-range, with additional facilities for the community as a whole. There will be a multi-level tower, a ball-wall for football and cricket practice and a trim-trail with some challenging obstacles to negotiate! For younger children there will be a log locomotive and railway carriage, along with a play hut. The equipment will be mainly of wood and should blend in nicely with the existing structures. Thanks to a generous discount from the suppliers, Sovereign, we have also been able to include three new picnic tables. Installation should have been completed by the time that this edition of The Grapevine is published. The Parish Council is delighted to have been able to enhance the park equipment and have no doubt that everyone, children and parents alike, will enjoy these new facilities.

Re-dedication of the Wasperton Memorial

Two years ago, we reported that Andrew Bailey of Melbourne, Australia, had contacted The Grapevine, asking for information on the crash of a Whitley bomber at Scar Bank on 23 July, 1943. The young pilot was Flying Officer Shalless, of the Royal Australian Air Force, in whose honour a scout hall had been named in Melbourne. Prompted by this letter, we rediscovered the memorial, erected in 1977 on the banks of the Avon at Wasperton. It commemorates both the crew of the Whitley, and also that of a Wellington bomber which had crashed close to the same spot in 1942. It was clear that the structure needed restoring and Kath Wright, with the help of residents of Wasperton, Hampton Lucy and Melbourne, raised funds for this to be completed. A new plaque, inscribed with the names of both aircrews, was placed next to it. A rededication ceremony, led by Rev'd David Jessett, will be held by the memorial on Saturday, 9 April, at 10.30am, to which everyone is invited. We believe it is important to remember the sacrifice of these young men from Australia, Canada, and Britain who lost their lives so far from home.

Dear Friends,

As I sit down to write, some words from this morning's news are still in my head: "Christmas wasn't white, it was 'orange'." One of our major supermarkets had published their Christmas trading results that morning and like-forlike sales were up 3.6% on the previous year. The results were significantly healthier than some of their competitors in the grocery sector and in the wider retail industry. That particular supermarket chain put it down to two main reasons. The first was that customers "traded up" to freerange turkeys, smoked salmon and their high-end range of products. "Taste the Difference," was flying off the shelves. The second was that when consumers came in to buy food, they also stocked up with other goods such as clothing and DVDs. As the Chief Executive put it, the customers were "...looking to buy those top-up non-food items in the convenience of a one-stop shop." Another supermarket chain, pleased with its results, put their success down to the same "trading up", but also to the fact that the company simply kept their shelves full so that, when people did get in through the snow, they hit the ground running. What about January? Well, it may turn out to be 'orange', but huge wouldn't be a very appropriate word because, as soon as we reach January, there seems to be a national dietary u-turn. Advertising pops up offering multiple ways to lose the

weight we have gained through "trading-up" over Christmas. To help us reverse the effects of what we bought the month before, the supermarkets offer discounted on-line diets with menus, personalised planners and even on-line support forums. Expanding and shrinking, feasting and fasting; in one way you could look at the beginning of Lent, Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday, in that light. The feast of pancakes on Tuesday and then abstinence for the forty days of Lent, (or as long as we last!) But underneath they offer something radically different from a supermarket Christmas and New Year. Shrove Tuesday used to be the time for using up the luxuries in the larder, perhaps as some of them were coming to an end for that year anyway; eggs, butter and sugar, etc. But it wasn't, and still isn't, just about the food. Perhaps the whole point of putting aside the luxuries is to step off the merry-go-round, to get out of that dynamic where we are pulled one way then the other and, instead, find some firm ground on which to stop and take a deeper look at what we are really about. There will be opportunities to do that over Lent, which starts on 9 March; courses, churches open in the daytime where you can enjoy the peace, services where you can hear more... look out for details...

There has been a positive response to the introduction of an entrance fee to the cathedral and the new Visitors' Centre, and the film on the cathedral has proved both informative and interesting. Worshipers have a separate entrance and are not charged, and admission is free on Sundays and for any of the services. The 'Cross of Nails', made from nails from the ruins of the old cathedral, inspired the creation of The Ministry of Reconciliation, and the actual cross is available to schools in the Diocese.
