The molten bell metal, at 1200 degrees Celsius, is poured into the mould buried deep in the sand pit, with only the casting box showing.

On Thursday, 2 February, twelve 'Lucy Lads' visited The John Taylor Bell Foundry in Loughborough. Jeremy Whyman drove the Wellesbourne Lions' minibus, and we stopped en route for a nice light lunch in Quorn. George, our volunteer guide, described the long history of the foundry, one of the largest bell foundries in the world, which has been associated with the Taylor family since 1784. He demonstrated the superior sound and resonance of bell metal, a copper-tin alloy, compared with cheaper alternatives such as brass, aluminium and iron, and described how bells are made. Briefly, a mould is made from an unlikely mixture of sand, loam and horse manure, and shaped with a "strickle", a cutting tool profiled to match the inner and outer surfaces of each individual bell. Once dried, the inner plug and outer mould are clamped together in a steel box, the

whole structure being buried in a deep sandpit for support, leaving only the top 'casting box' exposed, into which the molten metal is poured from a large

crucible operated by three men. Later, the bell is accurately tuned by machining the inner surface with a huge vertical lathe, a process carefully monitored by computer analysis, before being fitted with its head stock ready for installation. The high point of the visit was watching the casting of a pair of four hundredweight bells to replace ones recently stolen from Prinknash Abbey in Gloucestershire. Four of the Benedictine monks from the Abbey were there to see their bells being cast. The picture, taken from a gallery overlooking the foundry floor, gives an idea of this memorable scene. Asc

Dear Friends,

In the second half of this year it will be fifteen years since I began my ministry to Barford, Sherbourne and Wasperton and five years for Charlecote, Hampton Lucy and Loxley. A lot has happened in that time for me both personally and professionally, and some of it has been very challenging. Clergy are very fortunate in that, from time to time, (theoretically every seven years), we are allowed – even encouraged - to take a sabbatical. These are normally thirteen weeks in length. A few months ago I learned that I have been granted one for August, September and October of this year and so I shall not be working then. Instead, under Cathy's leadership a small team of clergy and laity will make sure that Sunday services run smoothly and that baptisms, weddings and funerals are all taken care of.

We are encouraged to have a few days 'retreat' at the beginning and the end. (Times spent in a place where it is possible to spend some time in prayer and silence.) Some of the time will be usefully occupied in doing some reading. (It's hard to fit that in normally.) But the intended highlight is that I hope to do part of the pilgrimage route to Santiago de Compostella in northern Spain.

Hampton Lucy Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 18 January, with all Councillors present. In addition to routine business, the principal items discussed included the defibrillator scheme, which was put on hold for the present in favour of setting up a CPR training scheme for all interested residents. After an appeal by representatives of the governors of the school, it was agreed to repeat the speeding checks on vehicles passing through the village at peak times. Councillors Main and Whyman offered to participate, along with Dave Holland and Martyn Harrold. In view of the increasing value of the playground equipment, the Council agreed to ring-fence a 'Repairs Fund' in the accounts. The arrangements for the Jubilee were reported to be well on track and funding was coming in very satisfactorily. Attention was drawn to the Boundary Commission's proposed changes, which would move Hampton Lucy and Charlecote into the Warwick constituency. The Council will lodge an objection. The Village Hall Committee reported a very successful year with fundraising events having been well supported and bookings for the hall increased since its extensive refurbishment. Charlecote Park - Looking Ahead

Charlecote Park and House occupy a special place in the heart of the local community. It may seem that the Park has been there forever, but change is inevitable. Every enterprise needs to plan for the future. Charlecote Park, and indeed the National Trust as a whole, is no exception. So, what of the future? Work will continue, using a strategic plan, to make better use of existing buildings, and provide improved facilities for everyone. A strong support team has now been built up, led by the Property Manager, Stephen Bennett. Over the next few years, work in the Park will include development of the old orchard area, management of the trees in high winds, the creation of a wildlife area and a fish by-pass between the Dene and the Avon, restoration of the Woodland Garden, and upgrading of the footpaths. The proximity of the peaceful River Avon is an important feature of the Park and every effort will be made to oppose any plans to extend the navigation on the Upper Avon through Charlecote. Inside the house, the conservation needs are paramount, with the replacement of blinds, ultraviolet screening and druggets, together with wallpaper and other repairs. Work is needed on the Lucy Carriage Collection and maintenance work to the fabric of the historic buildings around the site will continue. Many local residents and visitors appreciate the fact that members of the Fairfax-Lucy family still reside at Charlecote, and the Trust is determined to ensure that due consideration is given to the family's needs and wishes. It is because of them that Charlecote retains that widely acknowledged special atmosphere. Charlecote Park has a great future and has much to offer visitors. With the long history of the house, the peace and quiet of the Park, and the attractive gardens, it makes for a great day out. SF
