

Lucy Lads Get Hooked

On Thursday, 6 September, seven of The Lucy Lads visited Hook Norton Brewery, near to Banbury. Monty, our excellent guide, began by relating its history which began in 1849 with the purchase of the farm by maltster John Harris. Brewing began shortly afterwards, and received a huge boost towards the end of the century by the need to slake the thirst of the navvies building the railway from Chipping Norton. The present tower building was erected at the end of the 19th Century. Our tour began with the huge Victorian steam engine, gleaming and in full working order but no longer used to lift the heavy sacks of raw materials up to the top of the tower or to drive the mechanical processes of brewing. A tasting of the various malts followed, each malt differing in colour and flavour according to the temperature at which the germinated barley is roasted. After adding water to the mash tun, the hops, supplied by a Malvern firm, are added, and after boiling and cooling the 'wort', a culture of yeast, multiplied from a sample kept elsewhere in liquid nitrogen, is added and fermentation begins. To round off the tour, Monty showed how "real ale" needs to be stored and tapped in casks (not kegs!) After sampling some half dozen varieties of "Hooky", (Wow! - Ed), lunch at The Pear Tree was followed by a stroll up the hill to see the huge, placid dray horses, still used for local deliveries. Many thanks go to John Dunkerton for organising a most enjoyable trip out.


Charlecote Park News

The recently transformed Woodland Garden at Charlecote Park was officially opened in August by John and Betty Stolls, who have been volunteers at the property for 30 years. The garden was first designed in the 18th Century by Capability Brown. The present four-year project is introducing plants known to have been the favourites of Mary Elizabeth Lucy, or to have been collected by the local Victorian plant collector, Charles Maries, and will give the area the feel of a Victorian Pleasure Garden. Newly-laid paths, replacement benches, and other features make this once again a very special part of Charlecote. The October rut is a period of frenetic activity for the deer, and places on the tractor tours may still be available; (check the website, see below). Halloween will be marked with a special children's trail at half-term weekend. The park, gardens, restaurant and outbuildings are open seven days a week from 10:30am to 5:30pm throughout the year. Visitors can also explore the house, open Friday to Tuesdays until November, from the grandeur of the upstairs family rooms to life below-stairs in the Victorian kitchen and outbuildings. Hampton Lucy Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 12 September in the Village Hall, with all councillors present. In addition to routine business, Richard Elbourne, from Warwickshire County Council, attended and explained some of the options available to improve speed awareness at the entry points to the village. The Council decided to ask for funding for prominent 'tiger's teeth' road markings and 30mph roundels to be painted at the approach to the 30mph limit on Snitterfield Street and Stratford Road, and to arrange for the trees to be cut back where they obscure the 30mph signs. The clerk gave a financial report and the planning applications were discussed. Concern was expressed about the deep puddles collecting on Snitterfield Street, Church Street, opposite Wyvale and at the junction of Stratford Road with Warwick Road. The Clerk had been informed that contractors were engaged for this work. The Council asked the Clerk to vigorously pursue the urgent work needed to improve pedestrian access along the pavement between Hampton Lucy and Charlecote. The Council will next meet on 14 November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall and all residents are invited to attend. Full minutes are available from the Parish Clerk, Michael Woodman; 841205. AJW

The Miller's Tale



Many of you will have visited Charlecote Mill over the past few years, living history still producing stone-ground flour after some two hundred years, and situated on or very near to the site of watermills going back to Domesday and beyond. After being involved with the mill for some thirty four years and running it single-handedly since 1983 as a commercial proposition, John Bedington will shortly be retiring to pursue his many other interests including, not surprisingly, using his vast knowledge to assist other mill owners around the country with restoration and repair.

The modern era for Charlecote Mill began in 1978 when John was approached by Sir Edmund Fairfax-Lucy, the owner of the mill, to assess the possibility of restoration. John, a solicitor by profession but also Secretary of the Midland Wind and Water Mills Group, was well qualified for this and, on visiting the site, found that the machinery was reasonably complete, the water supply was still adequate and, although the building was deteriorating, it was restorable. He decided to take it on, (as one does!), arranged a favourable lease on the property, and set about restoring and repairing the mill. Luck was with him when the BBC commissioned the old mill as the location for their 1978 television film production of 'The Mill on the Floss', providing some welcome funds for the restoration. Over the next five years, John and several friends spent much of their spare time working on the fabric of the building and gradually restoring the machinery to working order, and when you visit the mill you can see the dedication to detail and authenticity that John has always pursued. By 1981 they had one set of stones working, after a fashion, and the mill was occasionally open to the public. In 1983 he resigned from his solicitor's practice and spent a hectic six months working on the mill, preparing to run it as a full-time business. By the end of that year he had

satisfied the Stratford-upon-Avon Environmental Health Department's requirements and started milling commercially, producing mainly wholemeal wheat flour. Much of his produce now goes to local shops and immigrant Indian and Pakistani families in Coventry, Leamington and the surrounding areas, who greatly value the flour for making chapattis. He can also grind maize to produce yellow corn flour, and is occasionally asked to mill chickpeas and lentils. Relatively recently, a Victorian white flour 'dresser' was restored and re-commissioned, producing white flour in smaller quantities. Although working single-handedly and completing a huge amount of major restoration work by himself, he has been supported over the years by his wife Rhoda, who regularly goes in to help and assists during the open days, and by a number of volunteers. There is always a never-ending list of maintenance and repair work to be done in such an organic process as milling and, as the operation relies entirely upon water power, keeping the wheels turning is essential. That is where enthusiastic amateurs can be a real help, taking on some of those time-consuming jobs whilst the miller gets on with his milling. I am fortunate to be one of those lucky few. I say 'lucky' because it is a rare privilege to be able work in such a fascinating and historic building, still milling pretty much as it did two hundred years ago

John is delighted that Karl Grevatt is taking over the mill and will continue to run it as a fully operational, commercial concern. He is well qualified to do so, being a professional builder who has specialised on the conservation of old buildings, so the old mill will be in good hands. With his partner Adrian, who works in the catering industry, they have plans to extend the scope of the mill over the next year or so and we wish them every success. I am sure that you will also wish John well for a long and happy retirement from milling, and with his work on watermills and windmills all around the country. Charlecote Mill will continue to be open for visitors on the first Sunday of each month through to October, and on Bank Holiday Mondays. If you haven't yet visited, do make the time to do so. Karl and Adrian will be delighted to see you and you'll experience a truly historic, living and breathing water mill, rescued by John from dilapidation and decay some thirty four years ago. For the bakers and bread makers amongst you, why not try the flour? It has taste, texture and flavour quite unlike the processed, refined flour that you buy at the supermarket and if you would like a recipe for wholemeal bread, just contact me, Jeremy Whyman, details on page 6.


