Loxley Church, Nestling in Rural Warwickshire



The major work necessary to restore St. Nicholas' church to its former glory has now been completed. A special service of dedication will be held at 3.30pm on Sunday, 6 October, when it is hoped that all who contributed to the appeal fund will attend and inspect the repairs which their donations have made possible. These include stripping and replacing tiling to the nave and chapel roofs, together with new rafters and purlins. On the tower roof we have replaced copings and some of the lead flashing plus timber repairs. Inside the tower there is a new bell-chamber floor and access and lighting have been improved. Unfortunately, in the course of these improvements more, but less severe, problems were found on the south side, but more of these in due course. Most villagers seem to appreciate their unique heritage and they are invited to reinforce that interest at the dedication service. ΤG



The Parish Letter



Dear Friends,

One of my first duties after coming here four years ago was to go and be introduced to the children at Loxley School. I sat at the front with David and the Head Teacher, Mrs Janet Clough and, after a warm introduction, suddenly realised I was expected to take the assembly. In my earlier training as a priest I had loved working in primary schools but had followed wise, unspoken advice: warm greeting, presentation or story, short prayer and sharp exit. The general aim was to avoid too much participation, mainly because the under-elevens are a highly exacting and unpredictable audience. Well, back to the moment of sheer panic, when thirty children sat staring expectantly in my direction. All I could think of was my dog, Harry. It was September. Some of the children were tiny, had just started school and might be finding it all quite strange. Harry had found it strange moving to Barford. New sights, sounds and smells, but bit by bit he was getting used to the new surroundings and finding totally new things he hadn't experienced before, like walking through the fields near the house and jumping in the river. They were listening and it seemed to be good; they liked Harry, they like dogs, ("God

spelt backwards," as Ali Speller always says). I then asked if any of the children had a dog. Thirty hands went up, all wanting to share at least a five minute story about their dog, or their grand-parent's dog, or their neighbour's dog, or their imaginary dog. It was pandemonium. We heard some elaborate stories and then I seem to remember being rescued by Mrs Clough.

That is how it has been at the schools in Barford and Hampton Lucy too, being shaken out of the comfort zone, diving in and having the huge privilege of meeting the children where they are, as they are, and learning from them, probably far more than the other way round. I think that could go for the six parishes too - Hampton Lucy, Charlecote, Loxley, Barford, Sherbourne and Wasperton. It has been an awesome privilege to move here, to dive in and be with you where you are, as you are, in daily life, and in the happiness and sadness of life, and to try to figure out where God is in it all.

Thank you for your welcome and for having us with you. Our love and prayers, now and in the future.

Heather Alford, speaker for the July meeting, became a volunteer in Nepal after the death of her husband, some ten years ago. Heather joined the Leprosy Mission, based in Kathmandu which nestles in the shadow of the Himalayas. Their vision is 'a world without leprosy'. Leprosy is a bacterial infection which attacks nerve tissue and causes paralysis of the muscles of the face, hands and feet. It is now curable with multi-drug therapy (MDT) and, over numerous visits, Heather could see an improvement in

the condition of the patients although it can take years for the victim be completely rid of the disease. A selection of crafts made by these disabled people was available at the meeting. The next meeting in Hampton Lucy Village Hall on Wednesday, 4 September, at 7.30pm, will be open to non-members at £5 pp, including a ploughman's supper, with entertainment by Ginny Davis of Edinburgh Fringe fame.

Charlecote Park is always busy in August, and this year a record number of children enjoyed the five week programme of the Children's Club, with activities varying from mask making to falconry and shepherding ducks. For grown-ups the focus this autumn is on deer. This starts with "Deer hunting in the house", a tour on 4 September looking behind the scenes, through paintings and artefacts, at the significance of deer on the estate. The 'Unmaking of the deer', 12 September, will look at the heyday of the deer park, deer as a status symbol and food source, and how deer would have been skinned and butchered. Hampton Lucy Housing Action Group Report

The property developer Charles Church is proposing to build a large number of new homes in Hampton Lucy on land off Stratford Road presently owned by Miss Creak. The 'Housing Action Group' has been set up in the village to oppose the proposal and to work with the Parish Council to ensure that any new housing developments in the village are proportionate to the size of the village and have minimum impact on existing residents. Stratford District Council (SDC) has approved a 'Core Strategy' for future housing developments. This strategy is now out for consultation before final sign-off and submission to the government for approval, likely to be in the autumn. One of the key parts of the strategy is the concept of 'Local Service Villages', (LSV), which aims to disperse some new developments into villages in the district, rather than concentrating them within existing major settlements. Each village has been rated according to their size and facilities, and the rating will determine the number of new homes permitted to be built over the next fifteen years. Hampton Lucy has been rated in the lowest category and would be expected to take between ten and twenty-five new homes over the planning period. The SDC proposals envisage a series of small developments spread around the village and built over a period of time, not all in one large site. Charles Church has sent plans to the Parish Council of the housing that it is proposing to build in the village. Their revised proposals are for a single development of twenty-eight properties comprising a mix of five, four, three and two bedroom houses, plus three and two bedroom bungalows. The latter bungalows are classed as 'affordable'. The planning application for this development was submitted to SDC by Charles Church on 1 August. These plans do not meet the requirements of the SDC Core Strategy in a number of aspects, with twenty-eight dwellings proposed against the maximum of twenty-five under the LSV proposals, the development will not be phased over a number of years and the properties will not be spread around the village. The Housing Action Group is committed to working with the Parish Council and the SDC ward Councillor to get the application rejected by Stratford District Council. **CS - Hampton Lucy Housing Action Group**

A Letter from the Chairman of Hampton Lucy Parish Council

The overwhelming feedback from the short questionnaire sent out by the Hampton Lucy HousingAction Group was: "No development!" However, even though we may want to, we will not be able to just say "no". The following is an extract from an e-mail sent to the Parish Clerk from SDC in response to the Parish Council's letter of 22 May. "The Core Strategy was agreed by Cabinet on 15th July. The assessment by SDC places Hampton Lucy in the lowest LSV category suggesting Hampton Lucy should accommodate between 10 and 25 additional dwellings over the remaining fifteen years of the plan, up to 2028". The document goes on to say that "....SDC's preference is that development should be phased and ideally come forward on several small sites rather than via one large one...... Assuming the policy is adopted, SDC is reasonably confident that they can control the scale and pace of development in a manner that would be more in tune with our aspirations for the village. However, in the short term, I regret we remain susceptible to the development industry continuing to promote more intrusive developments and will seek to justify them on the basis of the Council's current position regarding housing and land supply." SDC does not have a five year land supply, and this overcomes virtually all objections. The preference for several small sites is encouraging, but we do not have any deliverable sites available. The key word is deliverable, and unfortunately the land currently of interest to Charles Church is available and deliverable. Hampton Lucy Action Group and the Parish Council are trying to identify small sites that would have the minimum adverse impact on the village and are deliverable, whilst fulfilling the 'quota' defined in the Core Strategy. We are in a very difficult position with little to fight with and need to work together as a community to get the best for Hampton Lucy. Alan Scaife responds....

Sue Main says that we cannot just say no. That is what she told us in the village hall on May 15th, but John Dunkerton asked "why not?" and at least 91% of those present signed a questionnaire to say that they rejected the Charles Church scheme and did not wish to compromise. This was confirmed by the Action Group's own survey of the whole parish, mentioned by Sue above. The parish council should be guided by that. SDC's new strategy would not allow the Charles Church scheme, and they make it clear that Charles Church are trying to get in quickly before the new strategy is officially adopted. Sue appears to be on the side of Charles Church rather than SDC by pointing out that we have the land to offer (or at least Miss Creak does). What do we have to lose by saying NO? The developers have already improved their scheme under pressure, and cannot revert to the previous one.
