

# The Parish Letter



Dear Friends,

Later this month we shall celebrate Easter once again. Palm Sunday (13<sup>th</sup>), Maundy Thursday (17<sup>th</sup>), Good Friday (18<sup>th</sup>) and Easter Day (20<sup>th</sup>) will all be observed in special ways in our Churches. See the list of services for details. To attend something on each of those days and to follow the story through can be a very moving experience. So why do we celebrate Easter so much?

At a human level the story of Jesus' death is just the story of one man who got on the wrong side of some nasty, powerful people and paid the price with his life. But that has happened to any number of people down the centuries. Why do we remember this particular one?

Jesus' friends, the disciples, had been full of hope. They had seen in Jesus someone very special, someone they hoped was going to make a real difference to their world and their own lives. Yet suddenly, with his arrest and death in the space of 24 hours, that was all gone. What had looked like it might be a triumphal climax to all the amazing things he had done and said during the past three years ended with him gone – dead and buried. And with that, all their hope had gone.

But then, within three days, came something completely unexpected. They had a series of experiences that convinced them that Jesus had risen from the dead to a new kind of life – eternal life. And with that came a totally new kind of hope which completely transformed them as people and led to their message starting to spread from a few frightened, 'hopeless' people in Jerusalem to become a world-wide Church. And it spread that much because many others down the centuries who had lost all hope have found it in the story of Jesus' life and death too.

For in a way the message of Easter is that while God either can't or doesn't necessarily prevent dreadful things happening, things that for particular people take away their hope, Easter is a sign that, with God, life and hope aren't limited to the boundaries of human life that limit our vision. So even if we can't know what heaven or eternal life will be like we can have the perspective of our lives changed by the life - and death – and new life of Jesus.

May we all find new hope and joy this year in the message of Easter.

### The Spirit Of Charlecote Park



How would you sum up the "Spirit of Place" at Charlecote Park? This sums it up for many. "Behind cleft oak paling, and run through by the Dene and Avon, is Charlecote - seat of the Lucys for two dozen generations. Its views barely altered; its carriages, portraits, furniture and books indigenous - it is a place with a character of unchanging repose. Eight hundred years a family's home; it was thus in its middle-age when Queen Elizabeth I was welcomed by the first Sir Thomas Lucy, and a youthful Shakespeare reputedly poached deer in the Park. Sensitive to this spirit of antiquity, Sir Walter Scott dropped by as a Welsh bride began her work of building and collecting. House and parterre, brew-house, laundry and green court space form the brick-warm kernel of an ancient estate. Beyond the gatehouse lies its park - agriculturally unimproved and a rich habitat; it was once more formal long ago, until naturalised by

Capability Brown. And so it all remains - this timeless heart with new generations in its wings." # **Hampton Lucy and Charlecote WI**

Members enjoyed a talk on Roman Alcester by Laurence Thatcher at their March meeting. When he retired from teaching at Alcester Grammar School he became Chairman of the Trustees of the Roman Museum. He described the archaeological finds from the town's Roman fort which stood on Primrose Hill from 47

AD. The Roman site is situated two metres beneath the present ground level and, during the excavations, a Roman road was unearthed. Leather goods were also discovered at the bottom of a Roman well. Other finds included a granary, located where Waitrose now stands. All of the artefacts from the 2005 and 2011 digs were taken to Hereford for analysis before being returned to Alcester's museum, where an Open Day will be held on 6 July. During March, many members enjoyed an outing to the Assay Office in Birmingham, also visiting the Museum and Art Gallery and the recently built Library. Hampton Lucy and Charlecote WI will celebrate its 95th Birthday on 2 April and the speaker, Jo Carter, will bring 'A Lady's Maid' to the meeting.
